The Meaning of Lent

It is hard to believe that we are about to enter the season of lent beginning with Ash Wednesday on February 14, 2024 which is the same day as Valentine's Day.

Valentine's Day is believed to have originated as a Western Christian feast day honoring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine. The day is recognized as a celebration of love and affection. It's a day to express appreciation for the people we love and care about, whether they be romantic partners, family members, or friends. It's an opportunity to show care and thoughtfulness through varieties of means, such as giving cards, flowers, dinner, or spending quality time together. Valentine's Day serves to remind us to express love and gratitude, and to strengthen and celebrate the bonds we share with others. Wednesday is Valentine's Day when people all over the world celebrate the gift of love.

In first Corinthians 13, Paul tells us that love as the highest of the spiritual gifts. Paul does not describe love as a feeling towards another person but as an action towards the one loved. Paul describes what love does and what love is. Paul describes a loving person's behaviors. For Paul love is an action verb. The way you can tell if you really love someone is by your behavior towards them. Love is patient. Think about someone you say you love. Are you patient and understanding with them or would they describe you as being impatient and judgmental towards them. Love is kind. Some people say they love each other but when you hear them speaking to each other they don't seem to be very kind to each other. A loving person is patient, a loving person is kind, and a loving person's love is eternal. A loving person demonstrates love by their actions. Love is... Happy Valentine's Day

Ash Wednesday is a Christian holy day that marks the beginning of Lent, a season of fasting, prayer, and repentance, reflections, and preparations leading us to Easter. It occurs 40 days before Easter Sunday and is observed by many Christian denominations, including Catholics, Anglicans, United Methodists, and Lutherans.

Ash Wednesday originated in the early centuries of Christianity, evolving from ancient Jewish practices of penance and mourning. The message and imposition of the ashes, in the shape of the cross, remind us of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for our salvation. It is a reminder of his love, mercy, and the invitation to follow in his footsteps. It is a reminder of human frailty, mortality, the need for forgiveness, to seek reconciliation with God and others and an invitation to turn back to God and a renewed relationship with God. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter." This is why you will see the designation "Sunday in Lent" rather than "Sunday of Lent" in the naming of these Sundays. The reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection each Sunday.

Between now and then, take some time alone before God to plan your Lenten pilgrimage. Every one of us is in need of this special time of conversion. What a gift is our ability to understand the significance of Ash Wednesday, the meaning of Lent. Do not squander the gift. Take time, now, to map out your journey from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Nothing else is more important than this.

Upper Room Devotional

Psalm 50:1-2

The mighty one, God the LORD, speaks and summons the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting. Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God shines forth.

As the psalm opens, the psalmist declares praise for the God of Israel. "Praise" may call to mind light and upbeat music, pure happiness and joy. But to offer praise, particularly in a mixed theological setting such as was present in ancient Israel and in many places today, takes risk, specifically three risks. First, in praising we acknowledge a distinct authority—God. Second, in praising we acknowledge ourselves vulnerable. And third, in praising we express a commitment to the One who is being praised. These risks give praise its power.

To praise is to express a vertical relationship with a higher power in and over our lives. We are telling the world who we love, appreciate, honor, and on whom we rely. Now, as then, many authorities compete for our loyalty, and adherence to the dominant authority can offer safety. The ancient Hebrews were aware of the risk they were taking by saying God alone is God and worthy or praise. Yet they still proclaimed the power and authority of Yahweh, the one God.

In praise, we accept vulnerability. Hold the image of someone you love in your mind and feel the warmth of love in your heart. Would it be possible not to express this feeling? Yet, is it ever possible to express it fully? Still we must try. How much more, then, must we express our delight and joy in our ultimate Love, our God, even though it makes us vulnerable to do so? We leave ourselves exposed as we attempt to fully express our praise for God

Finally, when we lift a psalm of praise, we communicate that we stand in the goodness, grace, and mercy of God. And yet to fully receive these good gifts, our commitment to our relationship with God is necessary. We express this commitment through our loving obedience to God's word and will for our lives.

Great God, no matter the cost, we praise you! Amen.
