We Are An Easter People

When we look at Christ's humanity played in His passion, death, and resurrection, few questions come to mind: Did Christ want to die? Was Christ eager to be crucified? The answers here are "no" and "no." In both the Gospel of Luke and the Gospel of Matthew, Christ pleads with His Father to "let this cup pass from me." So, when we think of the crucifixion, we should not think of an enthusiastic self-sacrifice, but of a suffering servant. Jesus was not cheery in his final hours; by no means did he want to die such a terrible death, at a young age, in a disgraceful manner. All Christ wanted to do was to love perfectly to the end, whatever that entailed. And He did just that.

In The Last Temptation of Christ, Greek author Nikos Kazantzakis famously—and controversially—conjectured how afraid and hopeless Jesus might have been in His final hours, tempted to reject His cross and to settle for a quiet, ordinary family life. While this interpretation of Jesus's final hours is entirely Kazantzakis own, his thesis is intriguing and insightful: how much more splendid a victory is the Cross if we take into consideration that its victim was a broken and distraught man, who felt abandoned by His father and friends, and faced the temptation to relieve Himself of so heavy a burden. What if we embrace the possibility that Jesus, as He made His way up the road to Calvary, was quaking with fear and apprehension? And, most amazingly, despite all these utterly human experiences, Jesus preserved in His mission, loving perfectly to the very end!

Whenever we feel broken, abandoned, or afraid, we can look to the Passion as a model. Whenever we feel unsure or scared of God's plan for us, questioning whether we have the strength and fortitude to accept and it to live it out, we can look to Jesus the man for encouragement. He too was apprehensive of His Father's plan for him, He too struggled to accept where and how we were called, He too had to choose between settling for His own wants or trying to integrate them with God's will. Christ's death on the Cross was the fact that He accepted that death for us!

It is important to remember that it is not a sin to be afraid of God's will. Indeed, God will often call us far beyond our comfort zones, which is a naturally terrifying proposition. All we can do is try to follow Jesus and love perfectly to the very end, wherever that may lead.

The good news? It will always lead us the everlasting Easter banquet. We are, after all, an Easter people.

Upper Room Devotional

Psalm 121

I lift up my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come? My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth. He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber. He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep. The LORD is your keeper; the LORD is your shade at your right hand. The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night. The LORD will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life. The LORD will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore.

Psalm 121 takes us straight to the heart of what it means to embark on a journey of faith and trust. Notice as you read that the voice of the speaker changes. In verses one and two, we hear the voice of the lone pilgrim: "I lift my eyes" and recall that "my help comes from the Lord." but as we move through the rest of the verses, we find that the words of the first speaker elicit a refrain from elsewhere, affirming that "God won't let your foot slip" and "the Lord will protect you." Visualize this pilgrimage song as a call and response, with the leader beginning and the rest of the community of pilgrims singing out in unison as they step out together toward Jerusalem.

This can be your Lenten journey and your journey of growing in faith beyond Lent. You begin with the moment of centering, the moment of remembering with humility that you are God's precious creation. You trust God to keep and protect you as you take risks—to resist forces that evaluate humans based on their productivity rather than on their inherent worth as children of God; to ask deeper questions that might open up new insights about how God is working in the world; to wrestle with the images of who God is; to step into the gap between people of faith who are in conflict. And when you proclaim this intention to step out in trust to takes these risks, know that you are not stepping out alone. The community of God's people, stretching from our ancestor Abraham through all the peoples of the earth, journeys with you.

Gracious, protecting, loving God, bind me with all your people, and give us the humility, wisdom, and courage to step out in trust into your promise for all your creatures.
