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To hope, to believe, or love?

I am due for my annual physical in May. Yes it's the responsible thing to do. No, it's not up there on my list of top ten things to do. You know what's coming. Check cholesterol numbers, monitor blood sugar levels, order additional lab tests, and the always helpful suggestion from the doctor that this might be a good time to shed a few more pounds. If we really are fearfully and wonderfully made, we also have to admit there are days when we look in a mirror and sense more fear than wonder.

Have you ever wondered how incredibly well the body actually works on most days? Think with me for a bit. On an average day we breathe 21,600 times, blink our eyes 16,800 times, while our hearts quietly go about beating 103,680 times in a 24-hour period - all of that happening with incredible efficiency - and we never once have to stop and tell our hearts to beat, our eyes to blink, or our lungs to breathe. It's incredibly amazing.

When you think about it; it's all embedded deeply in our DNA, and it's such a natural part of who we are we rarely even think about it. We just take it for granted that every day, every night our bodies will simply do what they were designed to do.

So if God is the one who designed us, and if we really believe we're fearfully and wonderfully made in God's image, why do we still think we have to wake up every day and decide if we're going to hope, or believe, or love? If we don't have to tell our eyes to blink, or our lungs to breathe, or our hearts to beat, what makes us think we have to instruct our minds to believe, or our souls to hope, or our hearts to love?

Maybe it's already there inside of us and we just never realized it. The ability to hope, believe, and love coming from deep inside of us and as natural as the breaths we take every day.

Sometimes it takes a skilled physician to show you what's really going on inside of you. A good doctor will point out all the bad stuff and tell you to watch it. God, on the other hand, will tell you about all the good inside of you and tell you to trust it.

I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Psalm 139:14

Now these three remain. Faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is love. I Corinthians 13:13

Faith makes all things possible; hope makes all things work; love makes all things beautiful. Love leads you to hope; hope builds faith; faith brings you closer to God; so keep loving, keep hoping, and always have faith in God.

Upper Room Devotional

Read John 20:19-31

Our story goes back to the very beginning of the community that would become the church. Only ten followers of Jesus are present: Judas has betrayed Jesus to the authorities and is no longer with them, and Thomas is absent. It is the night of the Resurrection, though the disciples have only heard what has happened from Mary. Understandably, they ae behind closed doors, locked off from the world, fearful, afraid to come out of hiding, endangered, uncertain, directionless. Their prospects don't look good. Frankly, they look disastrous.

This is the perilous beginning of the community that would become the church. Their teacher and mentor has just been convicted of subversive speech, has been executed by a dishonorable crucifixion, and has been buried. They wonder whether they'll be next. Their future looks darker then dark. Then, against all odds, that same Jesus is in the room with them. And Jesus gives them new life.

This is the Gospel of John's most important story about the resilience of caring communities. These first ten followers of Jesus stuck together when they were under the gravest of threats. Facing their end and the end of their community, they didn't abandon one another. But, really, they only came to life when Jesus appeared. They were overjoyed! This is the true meaning of the Resurrection. When the future of a community of Jesus' followers seems humanly lost, the risen Jesus reappears among them—over and over—and makes hope possible again.

Many early Christian communities, doing the best they could but facing life-threatening forces, saw themselves in this story. It gave them the strength to go on. It happened once, at the very beginning, and it can happen again. Caring communities rely on something—Someone—bigger than themselves.

And then there was Thomas. For whatever reason, he wasn't there when his friends huddled behind closed doors, fearing for their lives, trying to keep their little community together. And then, when they told him what had happened, how Jesus had appeared and given them life, he wouldn't believe them. Thomas the doubter. Thomas: not the model member of a caring community.

The thing is, for all of later hearers of this story, Thomas represents us! In the Gospel of John, Thomas stands in for all of us who were not there in the room where it happened, who were not part of that first little group of followers fearing their end, who doubt that Jesus will reappear, who lose confidence in our own Christian communities and wonder if they are worth it.

Thomas was not convinced he should commit to his new community. But he got a second chance. A week later, when he was back together with Jesus' followers still hiding behind closed doors, Jesus appears to him, too. Jesus shows him the scars of his execution, and Thomas finally believes. Then, Jesus speaks to all the rest of us, all of us who may at times doubt the presence of the Spirit and the resilience of the Christian community to which we belong: "Do you believe because you see me? Blessed are those who don't see and yet believe."
